Item	Thank you for...	Background
1	...supporting HB 4 by Rep. Burkett/Sen. Schwertner	There were a number of foster care bills in the 85th. Some were big, complicated omnibus bills, and others were controversial. HB 4, however, was a very important bill that everyone could agree on. It is well established that children have better outcomes when placed with kin than in foster care. Before HB 4, the state did not provide assistance to "kinship families." That often meant a grandparent, aunt, or uncle could not afford to care for a child, and that child ended up in the state's foster care system. Despite HB 4, however, a federal judge found last Friday (Jan 19, 2018) that Texas has not done enough to fix its foster care system where "rape, abuse, and psychotropic medication are the norm."
2	...supporting HB 29 by Rep. Thompson/Sen. Huffman	For the past several sessions, Chairs Senfronia Thompson and Joan Huffman have championed human trafficking legislation and have authored "omnibus" legislation (a large bill with many provisions usually worked out with many stakeholders during the legislative process) to combat human trafficking. HB 29 was the 85th Legislature's omnibus human trafficking legislation.
3	...supporting HB 2783 by Rep. Smithee/Sen. Watson (vetoed)	HB 2783 would have closed a loophole that allows governments to use the cost of litigation as a tactic to prevent the release of otherwise public information. Despite being passed without opposition in the legislature, Governor Abbott vetoed the bill.
4	...supporting SB 507 by Sen. Hancock/Rep. Frullo	Balance billing is the practice of hospitals sending a "surprise bill" to a patient when one of the treating doctors is not in the network of the patient's insurer. In emergency situations, a patient in need of medical care is in no position to inquire with the hospital about whether the treating physicians will be "in network." SB 507 continues a several session effort to chip away at the practice and increase patient protections.
5	...supporting HB 10 by Rep. Price/Sen. Zaffirini	For the past several sessions, the House has prioritized mental health. HB 10 is the 85th Legislature's "omnibus bill" addressing issues of access to and benefits for mental health conditions and substance abuse.

6	...supporting HB 337 by Rep. Collier/Sen. Menendez	According to some estimates, as many as 25% of the persons in the Harris County jail have a serious mental health or substance abuse issue. Prior to HB 337, a person would experience a disruption in treatment that they were receiving in jail when they were released because of the bureaucracy of reapplying from Medicaid. County taxpayers were paying more to incarcerate individuals that relapsed rather than providing treatment. HB 337 ensures continuous eligibility for those individuals by suspending, rather than terminating, a person's Medicaid benefits, and reinstating those benefits within 48 hours after release.
7	...supporting HB 1342 by Rep. Parker/Sen. Hughes (vetoed)	HB 1342 would have provided comprehensive sexual abuse prevention training to children in public schools. Governor Abbott vetoed the bill because a parental opt-out provision was not included. Child advocates oppose a parental opt-out because the sexual abuser is often a parent.
8	...opposing SB 4 by Sen. Perry (Senate) or opposing Amdt. 9 to SB 4 (House)	SB 4 is the "sanctuary cities" or "show me your papers" legislation - a bill decided along party lines. The Senate's version allowed an inquiry into immigration status at the point of "lawful detention" - an extremely low legal threshold. For instance, should a person set off the metal detector while entering the capitol, that person is "lawfully detained." The House version scaled back the bill so an inquiry would be made only after an arrest. However, floor amendment #9 made the House bill like the Senate version. The House vote we included is the record vote on floor amendment #9. Final passage of the bill in the House was along party lines.
9	...supporting public education by opposing vouchers	The privatization of public schools (aka vouchers) is a major fault line between the House and Senate. SB 3 would have established a statewide voucher program, but had to be substantially narrowed to carve out certain rural Senators' districts in order to gain enough votes to pass. It was dead on arrival in the House. The House sent a message to the Senate by voting on an amendment (floor amendment 8) to the budget bill (SB 1) prohibiting the use of public funds for private education.

10	...supporting payday lending reform	Payday lending reform continues to be politically unviable since the failure of reform legislation in 2013. A record vote had not been held in the House since 2011. In a surprise move, Rep. Craddick offered a floor amendment to SB 2065. The legislative allies of the industry scrambled to oppose the amendment. They proposed an "amendment to the amendment" to poison the bill by nullifying city ordinances regulating payday lending. After the industry succeeded in a very close vote, Rep. Craddick pulled down his own amendment. Therefore, a "no" vote on Amendment 14 is a vote for payday lending reform. The Senate did not hold a comparable vote on the issue in the 85th Legislature.
